BOARD OF SELECTMEN

While there are many great year-round attractions which distinguish New England from the rest of the country, autumn is certainly high on the list for tourists to visit us and enjoy the annual foliage change. High on the Selectmen's list this fall is making progress on the Hewitt dam repair as we race to beat the turn of weather which winter brings. The weather will probably preclude us from starting construction to extend the water line through the Village up to the Grange and to the site of the new Emergency Services Building, but the request for proposal should be issued and bids reviewed before the end of the year. Other big issues we are discussing are the impact of pending Federal rulemaking regarding tribal recognition and, in conjunction with the Boards of Education and Finance, the status and plans of the school renovations.

Fall also includes elections and the opportunity to exercise your right to vote and participate in our self-government. If you would like more opportunity to participate in setting the direction of our town, consider joining a board or commission. We need your input and perspectives on the many important issues we face which directly impact our quality of life in North Stonington. NORTH STONINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

As Superintendent of Schools, I welcome you to the 2014-2015 school year. At the opening of our School Staff Meeting, six new teachers were introduced who have been hired to replace staff that have retired or left. The biggest changes occurred at Wheeler High School/Middle School. Kristen St. Germain, who served as Associate Principal last year, is now the new Principal and to replace Kristen, Ryan Chaney will serve as Associate Principal. A focus at our staff meeting was the changes in technology that follow our five year technology plan. One change in technology, that everyone will notice, will be the implementation of a new website. The rollout of the new website will begin at the end of September and be fully developed over the following weeks

The district is presently preparing to submit a grant through the School Security Competitive Grant Program. The grant will request approximately \$85,000 for the installation of additional surveillance cameras, computer controlled electronic locks, and entrance screening devices. If the district is successful in obtaining the grant, the state will reimburse the district 42% of the grant request or approximately \$36,000.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The 2015 Community Calendar has gone to print. This second annual calendar of beautiful barns, churches, and scenes around town will be available for holiday gifts and home-town remembrances for your college-bound kids. Buy yours at the library, town hall and several businesses.

We have continued to work on the Stewart Hill Trail off Wyassup Road. Near completion this fall, this lovely trail behind the old Arbor Acres enters a sloping hillside of oak, maple and hemlock with abundant wildlife. During our trail work, white tail deer, red fox and turkey have been seen as well as barn owls and even a grouse. The town-owned 24 acres abuts Pachaug Forest and newly acquired North Stonington Citizen Land Alliance property with the headwaters of Yawbux Stream nearby. Developing a trail to connect with the Blue Trail system is planned.

A yearly effort to monitor the numerous conservation easements our citizens have placed on their land continues. Such an easement is a wonderful way to preserve portions of your property and maintain its pristine beauty for years to come, while keeping it under your control and in its natural state.

As a CHOICES counselor, I am trained to assist individuals in Medicare and Medicaid enrollment. Open enrollment for Medicare is from September to December. Individuals retiring before or after open enrollment may call for supplemental insurance help.

The Senior Center is a valuable resource for all seniors in North Stonington. Applications for heating assistance are being processed and insurance counseling will begin on November 15th. Please call for an appointment.

On the first Wednesday of each month, at 11:30, the Visiting Nurse will take your blood pressure. Crackers and cheese will be served at noon. On the 2nd, 3rd & 4th Wednesday of each month, a wonderful lunch is served and prepared by Chef David Fede. The cost for the lunch is \$4.00. Please call by the prior Friday for a reservation.

Food is distributed each Friday, at 1:30pm. It is distributed from the United Way/Labor Food Center, thanks to "POPPIN" (Plenty of Produce for People in Need). Please bring your own bags for pick up.

Stroll over to the Community Garden behind Greene Gables to view their 2014 produce. All garden plots have been planted this year, including one planted by Wheeler second graders and another by Girl Scouts. The Community Garden Association is also working to raise funds for adding a garden shed to their site in 2015. Our thanks go to the Chelsea Groton Foundation for awarding a \$500 grant toward this shed project.

The Hewitt Farm Committee is pleased that the town is moving forward with plans to repair the Hewitt Dam. The dam was badly damaged by the infamous 2010 storm and the bridge has been closed since, limiting some uses of the property. The reconstruction contract has been awarded to Mattern Construction and work will have begun by the time you read this. The committee plans to use our pages on the town website and the North Stonington Bulletin Board to keep you apprised of any short-term impact on uses of the farm and to report on the project's progress. NORTH STONINGTON AFFORDABLE HOUSING COMMITTEE

We are pleased to welcome Paul Bliven to the Committee and still are looking for one other member to fill our remaining vacancy.

NSAHC has really moved forward this quarter on achieving some important goals outlined in our Housing Plan and in the Town Plan of Conservation and Development! We are working with the SPZEO to ensure that the revised Zoning Regulations will have provisions for new housing types to ensure greater housing choice and affordability. We are continuing to pursue the possibility of offering tax abatements in exchange for deed restrictions on homes and have successfully obtained a \$400,000 grant to initiate the Housing Rehabilitation Program. The NSAHC will be working with Milone and MacBroom on a state funded feasibility study for the potential development on the town-owned parcels off of Wintechog Hill Rd. and the creation of Incentive Housing Zone regulations.

Construction is beginning on the Watson Estates Subdivision which will contain 6 qualified affordable units. We are working with the BOS to identify and evaluate if tax delinquent properties can be repurposed as qualified affordable units.

Be on the lookout for our new educational display and video at the Library and at various Town-sponsored events to learn about why affordable housing is necessary for our community.

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Personal property declarations will be mailed on September 30th. If you have a horse or you have an unregistered motor vehicle, please complete the form and return it to the Assessor's Office before November 1st.

If you have a business and did not receive a form, please contact the Assessor's Office at 860-535-2877 ext 24. A business is required to file a personal property declaration in the town that the equipment is located. Failure to file or a late filing will result in a penalty. The penalty is an additional assessment of 25%.

Farmers requesting the \$100,000 exemption on farm buildings and farming equipment must file before October 31, 2014. Note that this date is before the last day for personal property declarations.

Applications for farm land and forest land must be completed before October 31st. If you wish to classify your land as farm land or forest land please contact the assessor's office as soon as possible. Forest land needs a state registered forester to help with the application. Our office has a listing of foresters who are certified.

NORTH STONINGTON VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY, INC

During the months of June and July 2014, your volunteers at the North Stonington Volunteer Fire Company responded to a total of forty-six emergency 911 calls for "help." Of these calls: eight were alarm activations; one was a brush fire; one was a car fire; two were medical emergency assists; three were hazardous material incidents; eighteen were motor vehicle accidents (some involving serious personal injuries); two were search and rescue operations; ten were service calls; and one was rendering mutual aid to a neighboring jurisdiction.

Of the forty-six emergency calls, eighteen occurred during the daytime hours (Monday-Friday, 0700-1600 hours) and fifteen occurred during the evening, night and weekend timeframes. The volunteers at NSVFC accumulated a total of seven hundred and forty-one man-hours in the service to our Town, while responding to these emergencies.

Four training drills were also conducted, in a continuing effort to maintain proficiencies when responding to emergencies. These drills involved: infectious/blood-borne pathogens protection; search and rescue techniques; extrication of victims involved in motor vehicle accidents; and Life Star crew operations. Volunteers accumulated an additional one hundred and twenty-five man-hours while engaged in training.

EMERGENCY SERVICES BUILDING COMMITTEE

Much has happened with the construction of the new Fire/EMS Building over the last few months. The architectural firm of Silver/Petruccelli have prepared and submitted a site plan with the planning and zoning board for approval. It is the committee's hope that, after its approval, we will be able to go out with a Request For Proposals (RFP) to secure an excavation company to prepare the site for construction. This phase of the project is expected to occur over the winter months, with construction tentatively scheduled to begin early spring.

The committee is finalizing both the floor plan and the elevations and design of the building with the architects and, hopefully, a presentation of the final version will be ready to be shown to the town sometime before the New Year. I think I can speak for the members of the Planning and Zoning Commission that we are saddened by the news that Juliet Leeming, our Senior Planner and Zoning Enforcement Officer, will be leaving this month for a new opportunity at seCTer in New London. She helped us articulate our vision and ultimately wrote the new Plan of Conservation and Development. In any case, however, we are all happy for her and wish her the best in her new job. Fortunately, Juliet has offered to stay on a few hours each week to finish some of the important projects that cannot easily be handed over to a new person. One project is the re-write of our regulations, which should be ready to go to Public Hearing after the holidays.

Another project is utilizing the HOME CT pre-development grant to investigate possible uses of the town-owned property off Wintechog Hill Rd., which would benefit the town long-term.

There are also several important enforcement issues that Juliet is trying to advance so that the new ZEO will have a firm plan to work with.

We have come a long way with Juliet in her tenure here in North Stonington – SeCTer is lucky to have her joining their staff. We can look forward to working with her in her new capacity. By the way, the Southeastern CT Enterprise Region (seCTer) has this mission: “to promote and preserve the region’s attractiveness, to encourage new businesses, and to assist and to nurture existing and expanding local enterprises.”

INFORMED CITIZENS OF NORTH STONINGTON

In September 2012, ICONS was founded by a group of residents who were frustrated with the amount of misinformation circulating around town during the failed budget referendums. We have made it our mission to provide accessible, accurate information, so residents can make an informed decision when casting their votes. ICONS is a non-political, grass-roots organization that does not advocate a position on any issue.

In April of 2013, ICONS was invited by the school administration to organize a Community Conversation focused on “North Stonington Schools: Their Place in our Community”. One outcome of the conversation was a strong request for better communication: communication among town boards, committees, and departments, as well as communication to and with townspeople.

ICONS responded to this need for information by obtaining support from the Board of Selectmen to produce “The North Stonington Quarterly”. This publication gives town boards, committees, and departments, as well as non-profit organizations, the opportunity to communicate important information directly to residents. Please let us know what you think about the Quarterly by completing the enclosed survey.

The importance of improved communication continues; our town government needs public input and involvement. Toward that end, ICONS will host a second Community Conversation on Saturday, October 18th at the Elementary School.
