BOARD OF SELECTMEN



On November 7th cities and towns across Connecticut will be going to the polls to elect their municipal leaders. In some towns, this could mean close contests. That will not be the case in North Stonington. The three Selectmen in our town are running unopposed. I hope the reason for that is because you think we are doing a good job, and not that no one else wants to run for our positions. Since we took office in 2021, we have tried our best to be available when needed and become good at listening to the taxpayers. We have always had the town's best interest at heart while never pushing individual agendas.

Knowing that we will not have to campaign allows the Board to concentrate on continuing to work on the initiatives that we started as well as positioning the Town for the future. One area that we believe needs improvement is the identification of possible grant opportunities. When we can use grant money rather than tax money from our residents, we can do wonderful things while not negatively affecting our annual budget. Most recently we were able to finish the resurfacing of three roads in Kingswood and a parking lot at our elementary school; all because of a STEAP Grant. We recently applied for a new STEAP Grant which would allow the Town to put a new roof on the Education Center's two-story wing and install irrigation on the schools' sports fields.

Thank you to all those that came to the Community Conversation held on September 9th. This was held to get input from our residents for our Plan of Conservation and Development as well as to listen to suggestions for the repurposing of the property where we recently demolished the old middle school. The Selectmen believe that Community Conversation format is a wonderful way to engage with Town residents. We hope to have more of these in the future when important issues arise.

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Personal Property Declarations will be mailed out in early October 2023, and the form must be returned before November 1st. Applications for exemptions on farm buildings and farm machinery must also be filed before the deadline or you will lose the exemption.

If you need help, the office will assist you in completing the forms. Remember there is a 25% penalty for failure to file so it is very important to return your personal property declaration.

If you have closed your business and received a personal property declaration, you must complete the section regarding the closure of your business. If you do not, we will assume that you are in business.

Farm and Forestry Exemptions: Applications for new farm and forestry land must be completed between September 1st and October 31st, 2023. The Assessor's Office has the necessary paperwork. Forestry applications must be completed by a Connecticut forester.

Active-Duty Members of the Military, here on military orders, must complete the Soldiers and Sailors Application to receive an exemption on their motor vehicles. Residents of Connecticut in the military also qualify for an exemption on their motor vehicle as well as a veteran's exemption. You must file with the Assessor's Office.

BOARD OF FINANCE

Hello North Stonington Taxpayers.

Summer has come to a close, school is back in session, and your Board of Finance is ready to begin with a full meeting schedule to manage the finances of the town. We'll start with working with the Board of Selectmen to understand the budgetary impacts of the newly created, but not yet vetted, 5, 10, 20-year capital purchase wish list.

The goal of this initiative is to determine what responsible, annual funding would look like to support capital equipment purchases. Funding capital at a "fixed" amount will eliminate having peaks and valleys in funding which creates uncertainty to the wallet of the taxpayer.

We expect the capital portion of the budget to be in-place prior to working on our operational portion. Hope to see you at upcoming sessions to assist in the process.

I'd like to thank you all for allowing me to serve on the Board of Finance over the last six years. It's been an educational experience for me and an opportunity to make many new friends committed to service of the town.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

2023 Hurricane Season is Here! Our collective focus is now on the inevitable hurricane season, which runs from June 1st through the end of November. Last year's hurricane season was like no other. It produced 30 named storms (the most on record); 12 direct strikes, and smashed the previous record of 9 strikes, during 1916. The 2023 hurricane season as forecasted by weather sources, will result in 16-20 named storms, including 7-10 hurricanes. Of the storms predicted to reach hurricane strength, 3-5 are projected to become major hurricanes (category 3 or higher). Storms that have maximum sustained winds of 111 mph or greater. This year's hurricane season is projected to be "above normal."

Absentee ballots are available beginning on October 6th, up until the day before the election. Absentee ballots can be returned by mail, dropped off in the Official Ballot Drop Box, or brought in person to the Town Clerk's Office during normal business hours.



There will be in-person voting on November 7th at the North Stonington Education Center (the old Wheeler Middle-High School), 298 Norwich-Westerly Road from 6:00am until 8:00pm.

If you have any questions regarding absentee ballots or the election, please do not hesitate to contact the Town Clerk. Remember that every vote counts, and every vote is important!

The Town Clerk's Office is open Monday through Friday from 8:00am until 4:00pm, except on legal holidays.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

The North Stonington Economic Development Commission (EDC) is busy planning the vision for economic development in North Stonington for the next 10 years. With input from community meetings which have been taking place, and advice from Juliet Hodge (who is spearheading the efforts to update the Town's Plan of Conservation and Development), the Commission is confident in providing a vision of what is possible in our community. North Stonington only has about 5.5% of its land zoned for commercial use. Couple that with the community's desire to retain the Town's rural character and it makes commercial development challenging. As a result, the Commission is looking for ways to assist present businesses through beautification efforts, and further development of the Route 2 corridor and the Exit 93 truck stop area.

Our business tri-fold planning is in the final stages, and will provide information about the businesses, restaurants, and attractions our Town has to offer. One of our newest members, Peggy Merck, has taken on this project and has done a wonderful job.

If anyone has any additional ideas about commercial development in North Stonington or wants to assist in shaping commercial development in our Town for the next 10 years, we encourage you to come to a meeting. This is possible in person or virtually on the first Monday of each month at 6:30 pm in the Media Center.

KEEPING NORTH STONINGTON AFFORDABLE

KNSA is currently raising money to preserve the 1840 one room schoolhouse on Clarks Falls Road. Following a 3-year legal process to get the deed restriction of 1854 changed, this historic property was given (quit claimed) to KNSA in August 2021, by the town. That restriction stated that the property could only be used for educational purposes. As the town centralized its schools in 1957 and closed the one room schools, the need for the building ceased. The restriction on the deed remained until the State Attorney General ruled that KNSA, which was granted a 501(c)(3) charitable status by the IRS, would fulfill the charitable intent of the deed by rehabilitating the school for affordable housing. This ruling further states that, "Any net proceeds received from the sale and use of the property shall be used by the Plaintiff (the town) for educational purposes".



When KNSA was awarded the winning bid in 2018, a grant was ready to be submitted for the school's rehabilitation and new use. The septic and well had been sited and approved. Unfortunately, discovery of the deed restriction prevented the sale, and the grant could not be submitted.

Since 2021, KNSA has maintained the exterior, gutted and cleaned the interior, and searched and submitted other grants. Until we obtain funding for rehabilitation, we seek to preserve the building by replacing the sill and resetting the foundation stones. WOOD-PAWCATUCK WILD AND SCENIC RIVERS STEWARDSHIP COUNCIL

In August, large mats of water chestnuts were discovered in Spalding Pond. This highly invasive aquatic plant was imported to the USA as an ornamental water-garden plant and has since escaped to our native watercourses. Water chestnuts form dense floating mats that can severely impact a pond's native plants and animals. One seed, if left unchecked, can result in almost 4 million plants three years later!



To prevent further damage to the pond, Wild and Scenic Rivers' members and friends spent over 30 hours removing the plants that had germinated this year. Hilaire and Kathie Cote were very supportive of our efforts and gave us permission to launch our kayaks from their property. Removing the plants involved hand-pulling the floating rosettes into our kayaks and wearing long gloves to protect us from the seed's sharp spines. Altogether we filled three small dump trucks with plants which we then composted off-site. Because seeds can remain viable in the sediment for up to 12 years, harvesting newly germinated plants every June and July will be an ongoing project for our group.

Water chestnuts thrive in quiet shallow watercourses where lily pads grow. A few plants were found in Clarks Falls Pond (USGS: Burch Pond) and removed; none were seen in Wyassup Lake, Green Falls Pond or Hewitt Farm waters. If you think you might have water chestnuts in your watercourse, please let us know. CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Conservation Recreation chapter of the 2023 Plan of Conservation Development is completed. What a year-long task! The town wide bike trail map continues to be planned for bikers to travel several routes: their length, elevation, and level of difficulty.

We learned recently by talking to folks about our trail maps that they were unaware of our brochures. All the state, municipal and private land organization trails are identified in a brochure available on-line in the North Stonington official website and are also available as hard copy at the Town Hall and Library. The Historic Hiking Trail map through the center of town and the Kayak/Canoe Trail map along the Pawcatuck River are also available.

As you hike the trails and paddle the river, we ask you to be good stewards and bring out any trash seen along the way and report any downed trees impeding the trails. Conservation easements (CE) have taken a turn this summer with activity on one site not allowed in the deed. Landowners who wish to conserve all or a part of their property in its natural state may place that property in a CE to be protected by your wishes in perpetuity. The town is entrusted, through regular monitoring, to assuring its forever protection. Contact us to learn more.

This method will help with all upcoming holiday wreath-making allowing greater control and using less materials than most methods of wreath-making. Hay and wire will be provided, and guests can take their bases home to complete decorating.

The Historical Society's Gardens and Dye House will also be open to visitors.

The North Stonington Historical Society is a non-profit 501 c-3 educational organization incorporated under the laws of the State of Connecticut. It works to promote awareness and understanding of the sociological, economic, political, cultural, and natural history of the area known as the Town of North Stonington. It provides advice to Town government, organizations and individuals interested in historic preservation. It helped the Affordable Housing Committee in its acquisition of an old schoolhouse and helped the Town to gain recognition and maintain the recently acquired Gallup House.

NORTH STONINGTON AFFORDABLE HOUSING COMMITTEE

The North Stonington Affordable Housing Committee (NSAHC) is appointed by our Board of Selectmen. We have been tracking the proceedings in Hartford that may have an effect on our town. In 1989, CT General Statute 8-30g was instituted in an attempt to increase affordable housing, by setting a goal that each municipality have 10% of their housing stock “qualified” affordable. This has been difficult for our town to achieve, and one size certainly does not fit all. Recently the state, in trying to determine the best approach to affordable housing, formed a Majority Leaders Affordable Housing Roundtable to examine the need and propose solutions to meet the need. Your AHC is following and will keep you updated.

Meanwhile, we are still promoting CHFA and USDA loans, as these loans count as qualified affordable housing for our Town without a deed restriction. Earlier this year we hosted an event to help explain the programs. If you missed it, the programs help 1st time homebuyers, or those who have not owned a home in 3 years), to possibly buy a home. Income limits vary, from 1 to 2 people - up to \$119,500; 3 or more people up to \$137,420; the ceiling price is \$481,175 according to the website. There are special rates for emergency personnel, teachers, disabled, etc.

It's worth checking out the website www.CHFA.org. The USDA site is a little more difficult to navigate but offers 0% down for qualified buyers, plus much more. Go to www.USDA.org.

We have also been working to identify properties that meets the needs that of the town while maintaining the feel of our community. We welcome any input. Feel free to join us at one of our meetings or contact a member of the committee with your thoughts.

As smiling students returned to classrooms this fall, they were greeted by excited and eager staff members, ready for a joyful and rewarding year of teaching and learning. Feeling safe, valued, and a sense of belonging is a natural outcome at our extraordinary schools, and we continue to imbed that goal throughout all academic and extracurricular experiences. For additional reassurance, and due to a generous donation, we rolled out an anonymous alert system for students and families to report issues about safety and wellness. We are enthusiastic to continue our discovery and implementation of innovative instructional practices, striving to stay up to date on how students learn best. Our elementary school is using a new reading program that promises even better results. Many teachers are exploring AI tools and strategies that will accelerate student learning and promote responsible use of ever-changing technologies.

A leader in education, North Stonington Public Schools recently became a candidate for district accreditation through the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC). We are the first school district in Connecticut to do so! Our administration and faculty are gaining national recognition, with Principal Kristen St. Germain representing Connecticut in Washington D.C. in October, joining principals of the year from 49 other states, and Jane Servidio, fourth-grade teacher, presenting at the National Science Teachers Association Convention on Invention Education. Also, one of our paraprofessionals, Wendy Arruda, is a published author of "[Silly Sounding Sentences: ABC Phonics Fun!](#)", and several copies can be found throughout the elementary school. There is much to be proud of in our schools! Our community collaborations continue to thrive, with generous support from Fire, Ambulance (donation of school supplies), Giving Closet, Food Pantry, PTO, North Stonington Education Foundation, Recreation Department, Board of Selectmen, and Board of Finance. We are grateful for grants benefiting our schools and town. Together, we will build a bright future for North Stonington.
