BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Town's Budget passed on the first attempt for the 2nd year in a row. There was also an increase in voter turnout compared to the 2022 referendum, with 170 additional voters casting ballots.

So, what does that mean? First it means that the Board of Selectmen would like to thank our residents for having confidence in Town leadership. We always try to listen to the citizens of North Stonington and act on the wishes of the majority. We do not have personal agendas and only have the Town's best interest at heart. Secondly, the first-time passage allows the Town to now move forward with other initiatives and issues that will need to be addressed in the coming months.

Transfer Station – Sticker Fees and Bulky Waste Fees: Bulky Waste Fees will start on July 1st. Vouchers for the Transfer Stickers will be sold at Town Hall Monday – Friday from 8:00am – 4:00 pm starting on July 5th. We will also sell sticker vouchers on Saturdays from 9:00 – 12:00 during the month of July starting on July 8th at the Transfer Station. No one will be turned away through the month of July for not having a sticker providing they have proof of residency. As of August 1st, there will be NO entry to the Transfer Station without a sticker.

POCD Visioning Session - Demolition Site Repurposing: Originally scheduled for Saturday, June 24th, a Community Conversation was postponed to a later date. Part one is a visioning session for the Plan of Conservation and Development. This document must be completed every ten years and sets the Town's direction for the ten years to follow. The second part is to discuss how the Town will address the repurposing of the space formerly occupied by the old middle school. The BOS will then take the information and ideas that were expressed and deliver the best ideas to a Town Meeting for additional feedback and a Town Vote. The Board of Selectmen will advertise a new date for this event once one has been determined. If you have not already done so, please consider filling out the POCD survey.

2023 PLAN OF CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT

Every 10 years, the Town of North Stonington needs to complete a long-range comprehensive plan, known as the Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD). The POCD reflects community consensus on all aspects of future growth in town, articulates a clear vision and serves to guide the future development of the town. The recommended goals and objectives of the POCD serve as the town's strategic plan for the future and are in turn supported by the zoning and subdivision regulations, town ordinances, and actual land use decisions.

PAWCATUCK NEIGHBORHOOD CENTER

During the summer months, many families whose children receive free school lunches feel the void that those programs fill. In fact, many families find it difficult to provide weekend food. To meet this need, the PNC Weekend Backpack program provides food for North Stonington children every Friday. The program continues during the summer months.

Terra Firma Farm, located in North Stonington delivers milk each week. Meat, fish, bread, fruit, snacks, eggs and pasta are also provided. Fresh vegetables are donated from the PNC's own garden, local gardens, CT Food Bank and Gemma Moran Food pantry.

North Stonington seniors have volunteered at the PNC since its incorporation in 1986. According to PNC volunteers, they gain as much from the experience as the people that they serve. North Stonington resident, Brian Hager has volunteered for several years in the food pantry. In that role, he has worked with many North Stonington residents as well as volunteers from neighboring towns. PNC volunteers are primarily persons who have retired and are looking to give back to the community, meet new friends and often connect with old ones.



The food pantry is available to North Stonington residents of all ages, Monday through Friday, 9:00 to 3:30. Patrons also find hygiene items, diapers, and pet food. EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Hello, my friends. Here we are once again, looking at the beginning of our hurricane season. The official forecast for the Atlantic hurricane season which runs from June 1 to November 30, predicts a 40% chance of a near-normal season, a 30% chance of an above-normal season and a 30% chance of a below-normal season. NOAA is forecasting a range of 12-17 total named storms (winds of 39 mph or higher). Please remember that it only takes a “tropical storm” level event to wreak havoc on our town. Do you recall Tropical Storm “Irene,” 2011?

The impact/influence of El Niño (warmer water and temperature) usually “feeds” a storm system, so the impact of this condition on our weather is still somewhat unpredictable. The best advice I can give to you is to ALWAYS stay prepared to survive for at least three days for ALL emergency events. It doesn't always have to be a storm that causes an emergency situation for North Stonington.

During the interim, I have participated in many behind-the-scenes training events regarding school active-shooter hazards and fire drills. The school staff and students’ excellent responses during these drills are impressive.

I’ve sworn in my new Deputy Director of Emergency Management, Fire Chief Charles Steinhart V. Welcome, Charley!

So, stay prepared...watch weather reports and sign-up for “CTAlert,” to keep apprised of emergency weather conditions. **Stay Well! Stay Safe!**

PLANNING AND ZONING OFFICIAL/LAND USE OFFICE

My name is Ariel Lago and I am currently a resident of Haddam, CT. I am a small farm owner and enjoy learning the farming life. Since accepting my new position as Town Planner for North Stonington, I have been focused on expanding my knowledge of conducting planning and zoning in a rural town. I am enjoying my time here and working with great people, such as those who serve on our Economic Development and the Planning and Zoning commissions. I have set my goals to identify the interest of the town’s residents and hope to meet their expectations in reaching some of our POCD goals. I am very grateful for this opportunity and hope to provide guidance and support to the goals of our town’s residents. As time goes on, I hope to share more success stories that reflect a farming community.

New Pending Project: The proposed Wedding Barn falls under the "Hospitality" use which is permitted in the EDD Zone. It is not being proposed as a ‘winery’ as there is no proposed production of wine on the site. The grapes being grown currently are to be used elsewhere. They can essentially be thought of as landscaping/buffer for this project. As alluded to above, the use could also be considered “Mixed Use”.

The Parcel is perfectly situated right by exit 92 on and off ramps— and all primarily access to the property is over state roads. Other than the single residence across the street, the property is surrounded by commercial and industrial uses, a church and cemetery and other open fields/vacant parcels — except for the one residence, church and cemetery, all abutting parcels are located within the EDD, or I district.

The proposed Vineyard and Wedding Barn beautifully enhances the property while preserving the existing farmland on the former Crider Farm; only a portion of the parcel is being used. The project represents an excellent balance of appropriate small- scaled development and conservation of land, which is the primary goal of the POCD. The use will complement similar uses in Town and serve as an attraction for visitors. Our Planning and Zoning department looks forward to sharing more exciting news for the town and all its residents.

MESSAGE FROM YOUR WATER POLLUTION CONTROL AUTHORITY

The WPCA has posted important information on the Town's web site under the WPCA and Land-Use departments, "TIPS FOR SEPTIC SYSTEM CARE". The guidance provides important information regarding the proper maintenance and operation of an on-site septic system for both residential and commercial use. Because North Stonington almost exclusively relies on on-site septic systems and drinking water wells, following the guidance, and properly maintaining one's septic system, will help prevent public health nuisance conditions, ground water pollution and, in the end, avoid the expensive cost of repairing or replacing the septic system, which can be tens of thousands of dollars.

KEEPING NORTH STONINGTON AFFORDABLE



Keeping North Stonington Affordable (KNSA) is proposing building 25 affordable rental apartment homes at Wrights Road on town owned land. Gaining site control of approximately 10 acres is the first step in seeking state or private funding to build these rental apartments. Gaining site control is governed by state statute 8-24. It states the following: the Board of Selectmen must consider and pass approval to the Planning and Zoning Commission; upon P&Z consideration and approval, the question is passed to the people either at a town meeting or referendum for consideration. If site control is obtained, but funding is not secured within a specified time, the land would revert to the town.

Use of this land for affordable housing would honor the desire of the donors when they gifted 109 acres of land to the town. Our Plan of Conservation and Development supports the need for more affordable choices in housing.

North Stonington has only 1.2% deed restricted affordable housing, the lowest in our region. This is an opportunity to address that need. Keeping North Stonington Affordable is a 501(c)(3) tax exempt corporation with a board of directors comprised of North Stonington residents. Our motto is "Providing a Hometown Solution". Your support will help provide a solution to the housing shortage in our town.

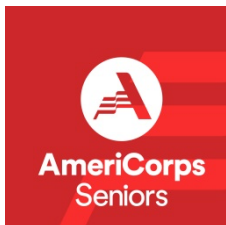

HEWITT FARM

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Following many, many hours of planning for two grant applications to create a universally accessible wheelchair trail, they were not accepted. The town cannot handle the expense in its yearly budget, so we must forgo what we hoped would be a worthy addition to our trail system.

If you haven't been by the Pocket Park at the intersection of Routes 49 and 184, please do so. Many passersby comment on the beauty this park has contributed to the area. More improvements to come as the arborvitae trees along the rear are becoming overgrown.



We regularly monitor over 30 conservation easements in town to assure landowners are compliant with what is written in their deed. This assures others who may want to conserve all or part of their property in its natural state that the town will protect their wishes. One such breach has occurred necessitating enforcement actions.

We participated in CT Trails Day in June and have led high school groups along our "Historic Hiking Trail" through town center. They are always amazed at the different types of architecture along Main Street and the history surrounding them.

By fall we hope our efforts to complete a biking trail map will be finished. As numerous bikers use our roads this map will include several routes around town, their level of difficulty, mileage, and elevations.

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

As July approaches, Tax Bills are going out. Remember, **if you sold or junked a motor vehicle** and did not use the same license plate on a replacement vehicle, you need to submit the plate receipt to the Assessor's Office. The Department of Motor Vehicles does NOT inform my office when a motor vehicle is sold or junked. All you need to do is go online to the Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles website, cancel the vehicle registration, and print the receipt. Turn in that receipt to the Assessor's Office, and a correction will be made on the tax bill for that vehicle.

Renters looking to qualify for the State of Connecticut Renter's Rebate Program need to apply to the Assessor's Office before October 1, 2023. The income-based program for renters who are 65 years old on January 1, 2023, or anyone with a S.S. disability who has an income less than \$49,300 for a married couple or \$40,300 for a single person, may apply. The State of Connecticut will send a check based on your expenses and income to all renters that qualify.

To apply for the Connecticut Renters Program, proof of income including your social security statements and your tax return for 2022, plus your rent expense and your statements for utilities, including heat and electricity. The Assessor's Office will assist in completing the paperwork.

TAX COLLECTOR

Hello North Stonington. Hopefully summer will be in full swing soon and we will all be complaining about how hot it is, but as of this writing it is chilly, windy, and only 60 degrees. Unfortunately, with summer comes tax bills. Bills will be sent out in the mail at the end of June with a due date of July 1st. Remember you have until August 1st to pay without interest. On August 2nd the interest will be 3%, due to state statutes, which say interest accrues from the due date. Therefore, 1½% for July and 1 ½% for August. Please do your best to pay before August 1st. If you have any questions, upon receipt of your bills, please do not hesitate to call my office or the Assessor's Office. It would be best to call immediately, in case you need to obtain documentation for a correction or change.

ONLINE BILL PAY: When using your online bill pay, through your personal banks, be sure to put a current year bill in the memo. We receive many without any bill information to process the payment. We will only spend so much time looking and will then return the check or apply to the oldest bill due in the name on the check. Also, be advised that these payments come **without a postmark** on the envelope. This can become a problem when closing in on the deadline to pay. According to state statute, we can only back date a payment using a post office post mark. Therefore, if you choose to use this service give your bank plenty of time to get that payment to the tax office before the last day to pay.

Please stop by, say hello, and receive a receipt for your payment.

Wood-Pawcatuck Wild and Scenic Rivers Stewardship Council

In everyday life, North Stonington's two rivers, the Shunock and Green Fall, are seemingly shy watercourses. Yet they are both important partners with five other Wood-Pawcatuck Watershed rivers as they enter the Pawcatuck River and empty into the Sound!

The Shunock and Green Fall Rivers and their tributaries can be dynamic when unleashed by a tropical storm or high rains, as most of us have learned! Mostly, though, they flow through town quietly and unnoticed. Shunock is serpentine: Green Fall is straight as a ruler. They pass within peoples' back yards, out in the fields, under road crossings, and around fallen trees and scrub; now and then we have a lucky glimpse.

The WP Wild and Scenic Stewardship Plan meshes easily with North Stonington's own Inland Wetlands and Land Commission regulations. Here is one shared item: educating ourselves about the importance of retaining riverine natural ground cover so that the Shunock, Green Fall, and their tributaries will be able to boast that every one of their embankments is, or will soon be, a buffer of 100 feet that is green, not mowed, and natively planted.
