BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Happy Autumn! As the seasons change, the Board of Selectmen likewise are considering change to bring more effective operations to the Town's general government. The Board has appointed a Town Government Structure Committee to conduct studies and provide recommendations regarding alternate forms of town governance and/or management and the benefits such recommendations would provide. Some aspects to be assessed might include staff changes such as an addition of a finance director or a town manager. The Committee has been requested to complete their assessment and provide recommendations in six months.

On a related note of improving operations, August saw the resumption of Tri-Board meetings with the Boards of Selectmen, Finance and Education. Members discussed potential topics for exploring strategic planning such as economic development efforts, cost reduction ideas and continued execution of the Plan of Conservation and Development. Residents are encouraged to attend their meetings, usually the fourth Thursday of the month at 7:00 pm in the Wheeler High School Media Center.

With school back in session, the Board reminds motorists to drive defensively and watch for school buses boarding and dropping off children.

BOARD OF FINANCE

The Board of Finance believes that the revised budget presented to the people of the Town of North Stonington, with amounts cut as presented, represented the best budget that we could have proposed under the current State and local economic circumstances.

The proposed budget is fiscally responsible and it keeps all services intact. It keeps money in programs related to social services, public services, education, sports programs and after school activities, recreation departments, as well as public safety. It also keeps the Town moving in a forward direction, investing in our future and setting us up to be in a good financial situation, in spite of the debt that we will have to repay over the next 20 or so years.

The Highway Dept., Town and School employees all received their contractual pay increases. Where other towns are eliminating jobs to balance their budgets, we believe that reductions in spending can be just as effective, without having to effect services.

We hope that by the time the people of North Stonington are reading this Quarterly edition, we will already have a budget in place and can begin to work and focus on other important issues and responsibilities. We are nearing the end of this year of challenge and change.

We are determined to continue to work together, with each other and the other Boards and Department Heads, in order to keep the lines of communication open and continue to find ways to work together to achieve the will of the people in the most cost effective manner possible.

Our meeting agendas & minutes are posted on the Town Website. We encourage the taxpayers to attend our meetings, participate in the discussions that we have and to bring forward ideas and suggestions that can potentially benefit us all.

NORTH STONINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

It was an extremely smooth opening to the 2016-2017 school year. As always, there was a lot of activity in our buildings over the summer. The busiest departments were the technology and custodial/maintenance staffs. Over the last couple of years, through grants and the generosity of the town, our technology has become state-of-the-art at all grade levels. That means the summer is a very busy time to do the necessary replacements, updates and repairs. Most importantly, the technology department continues to upgrade our security systems every summer. Maintenance did a great deal of repairs and our staff and students came back to spotless halls and classrooms thanks to our custodial staff.

The fall is always a very busy time when students and staff are adjusting to a new school year. Academically, over the last few weeks, we have received some excellent news regarding our mandated state standardized tests. Our students' achievement is measured using the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (SBAC) assessment results, the Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT), and the CMT/CAPT science assessment. The principals will better inform you on their respective school's results in their Quarterly remarks.

While our test scores are excellent, they only tell part of the story of our student and teacher success. Our test scores do not demonstrate the high quality teaching and learning in art, music, world languages, technology education and health/physical education.

EMERGENCY SERVICES BUILDING COMMITTEE

As reported in the Summer submittal for the Center for Emergency Services project, initial bids for the construction phase of the building fell beyond the approved budget of \$6.3 Million. Consequently, the committee was chartered to focus on a design reduction with Architectural firm Silver-Petrucelli that would yield a facility that did not exceed the approved budget of \$6.3 Million. With input from the Operations personnel from the Ambulance and Fire-Rescue teams, as well as Architectural input from Silver-Petrucelli, Schematic drawings have been developed. These satisfy the operational needs of the Fire/Ambulance, as well as present the best opportunity to maintain budget. This goal can only be realized from the returns of the Bid Process.

Its large beaver meadow has become a popular nesting area for ospreys and great blue herons. At least two osprey and nine herons successfully fledged from the nests. NORTH STONINGTON VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY, INC.

During the months of June, July and August of 2016, your volunteers at the North Stonington Volunteer Fire Company responded to a total of 77 emergency 911 calls. Of these calls 1 was electrical related; 1 was a CO2 detector alarm; 10 were brush fires; 5 were R1 medical emergencies; 1 was an automobile lock-out; 2 were water rescues (both fatalities); 3 were vehicle fires; 2 were search and rescues; 4 were trees/power lines down/on fire; 15 were motor vehicle and motorcycle accidents (some with serious personal injuries; two fatalities); 6 were mutual aid rendered to neighboring towns; 6 were medical calls; 3 were hazardous material responses; and 17 were false alarms.



Responding to these calls required 785 man-hours of volunteers' personal time; an average of 10 volunteers responded to these calls. There were 41 emergency calls during the daytime and 36 during the after-hours timeframe.

Your volunteers at the North Stonington Volunteer Fire Company also expended a total of 140 additional hours involving drills and training, in order to improve their proficiencies in life-saving skills. These drills included compliance issues, boat rescue operations, brush fires, SCBA (Self Contained Breathing Apparatus) and tanker shuttle operations.

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

❖**Personal Property Declarations:** Personal Property Declarations will be sent out by October 1st 2016 to all businesses located within the Town. If you do not receive a Personal Property Declaration Form by October 4th, please call the Assessor's Office at 860 535 2877 x 24. We will replace the form.

Please note: Personal Property also includes horses and UNREGISTERED motor vehicles. Horses have a \$1,000 exemption per animal ONLY if you file the declaration form. If you do not file, you do not receive the exemption.

All Personal Property Declaration Forms are due back to the Assessor's Office before November 1st at 4:00 pm. There is a 25% penalty for failure to file your personal property declaration on time. If you need an extension of time, you may call the Assessor's Office before October 15th and request an extension.

❖**Farm and Forestry:** Farmers must file for their exemption of up to \$100,000 on buildings and equipment before October 31st. Note the earlier date for your personal property declaration.

New farm and forestry applications must be filed before November 1st, for the October 1, 2016 Grand List. Forestry applications must have a State Forester review the land before the application is submitted.

❖**Veterans:** New residents who are veterans must file their DD 214 form with the Town Clerk before October 1st in order to receive their exemption. Social Security Disability recipients must file their award letter before October 1st in order to receive their exemption and to be eligible for the Homeowner's Program.

REMINDER:

The Department of Motor Vehicles does not inform the Assessor's Office when you sell a motor vehicle and do NOT use the same plate on the replacement vehicle. Also, if you move out of State, we are not informed by DMV. Therefore, if you sell, junk, or move out of State with your motor vehicle, you must show us what happened to the car to get credit on your tax bill. Examples of what you need to prorate your motor vehicle tax bill are the plate receipt, which shows what happened to the car; junk receipt from the dealer; Bill of Sale; or new State registration.

We are pleased to share the following article

Valley View Dairy, LLC, of 58 E Clarks Falls Road, has been named a **2017 Dairy Farmers of America Member of Distinction**. This award is given annually to only seven farms (one from each of DFA's seven Areas) from nearly 8,500 DFA member farms nationwide.

This program was created to celebrate the co-op's diversity and to recognize DFA members for their vision and innovation in the dairy industry, and to ensure success in dairying while setting a positive example for the rest of the DFA membership.



Ben and Tim Learned, operators, have been milking since 2009. They recently completed renovations to their existing dairy facility to contain a walk-through foot bath, feed bunk extension, and increased the barn capacity with 14 new stalls. They currently milk 60 head of cows, utilize the services of Dairy Herd Improvement Association., and installed an activity monitor allowing them to track herd activity.

They will be a guest of honor at the DFA Annual Meeting in March, 2017, in Kansas City, MO.

NORTH STONINGTON AFFORDABLE HOUSING COMMITTEE

The Affordable Housing Committee has approved an effort that is being made by a group of residents to form a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation. Their goal is to add to the diversity of housing serving Town residents, future residents and Town employees.

The vision put forth in North Stonington's Housing Plan ("...to be a community comprised of people of all ages and income groups...") needs to be more directly implemented than can be done within the framework and charge of our Committee. Our scope of work as an advisory committee includes: education; documentation of affordable housing needs; work with Home Connecticut; and consensus building. While successful, our work is limiting. The Town needs to have a strong, independent entity that can directly interact with the Town, developers and land owners. The corporation, being a non-profit entity, could access grant and Department of Housing money directly to assist in the goal of affordable housing development, receive property suitable for development, and issue Request for Proposals to non-profit or other developers. The work of the North Stonington Affordable Housing Committee would continue hand in hand with the proposed non-profit.

SCHOOL MODERNIZATION COMMITTEE

Hello neighbors! Believe it or not, much progress has been happening with the School Modernization Committee. As you may remember, the Town approved the referendum for School Modernization contingent upon state funding with the ability for us to spend up to 1.59 million dollars in preparation of the project. Although very little of the monies have been spent, the committee has been working extremely hard this summer; in fact meeting 16 times since June to make sure we are completely prepared and ready when funding is approved.

The committee is made up of a very diverse and talented group of residents including a lawyer, construction professionals, financial managers, an educator, a building supply specialist, engineers and individuals with many years of project management experience.

Accomplishments this summer include application to the State Office of School Construction Grants for state reimbursement, application and initial approval from the US Department of Agriculture for a loan with an interest rate locked in at 2.75% (a lower rate than was quoted when the referendum passed), creation of a fair and detailed ranking system, which will be used to select our construction partners, and selection of the highly qualified Architectural Firm of Quisenberry/Arcari to put final plans together for the school.

In September, we will be using our rankings matrix to select a Construction Management firm, which will oversee the project from start to finish. We also will look to meet with educators and administrators to get additional feedback on our design. Additionally, we will have a pre-construction meeting with the State of Connecticut's Office of Construction Grants to make sure we are completing all tasks necessary for a smooth process.

We hope to see our Middle School/High School students in the new facility by the 2018 school year and Elementary students in their new school by the 2019 school year, if not sooner.

Anyone is welcome to attend our meetings that take place most Monday evenings at the New Town Hall at 7:30pm. We welcome public feedback and input. Thank you for your continued support of this exciting upgrade to our town!

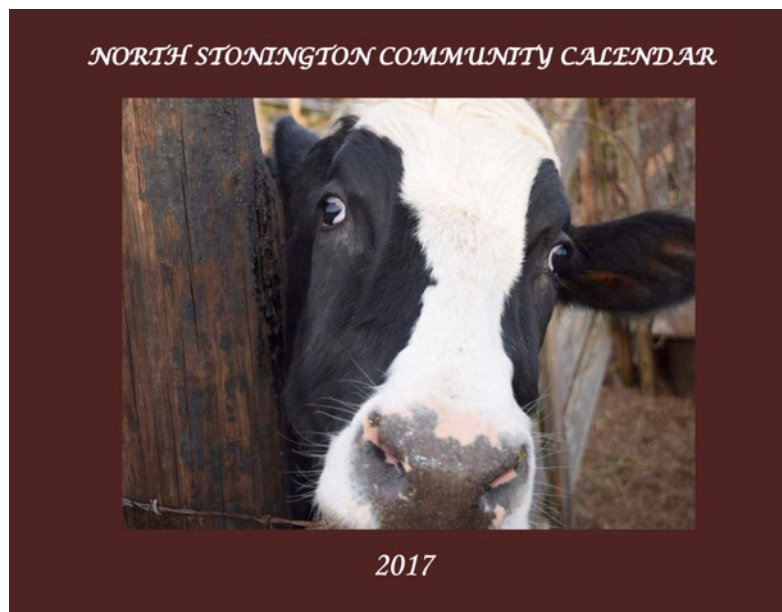
