#### **BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

The Yule is an appropriate time for reflection on the past year as well as a critical point for strategizing about the coming months. Each year, there are new or increasing challenges to maintaining the quality of life in our Town and 2017 will be no different. State budget woes may translate to reduced grants to municipalities. The recent court decision on the manner of educational funding and support may also impact us. And a generally improving economic environment may cause developers to consider applying for housing projects at odds with our Plan of Conservation and Development. In the face of these pending uncertainties, our community will continue to work on completing several important objectives and critical infrastructure projects.

Bids are expected to be solicited in January for the construction phase of the Center for Emergency Services with work planned to begin in the spring. Final State approvals have been received to permit the continuation of the public water line from the Town Garage to the Grange and from Main Street in the Village up Rocky Hollow Road to the Center for Emergency Services. The School Modernization project continues to progress on schedule. Recommendations from the new Town Government Structure Committee will be available in the February/March timeframe. And of course, there is development of the annual Town budget to be conducted.

2017 may very well be a pivotal year for the Town through the advancement of infrastructure projects, evolution of town governance and commitment of strategic budgetary decisions. Which is all the more reason to become involved in helping to address the future uncertainties and move our community closer to the goals captured in the vision of the Plan of Conservation and Development. Please consider participating on a town board or commission. To find out more information, contact the Town Clerk or First Selectman's office at Town Hall.

Of course, when building a budget, it is always difficult to predict the exact costs of doing business when you are predicting out, sometimes a year or more, into the future. The Superintendent's budget will be presented to the Board of Education in January. Once presented, a series of budget hearings will be scheduled as the BOE will deliberate over it, as they have the final authority in approving the budget. Once approved, it becomes the Board of Education budget, which will be presented to the Board of Finance.

The winter, while always challenging in terms of weather, is also very busy with activities at our schools from early morning through the evening. The Elementary and Middle/High Schools are busy rehearsing with their respective Drama Clubs and will have their productions in early spring. The Gymatorium will have its usual activity, with boys' and girls' Middle/High School basketball. As always, feel free to drop in and enjoy a game.

While mandated state testing will not begin until early spring, the process of preparation is ongoing.

#### PLANNING AND ZONING OFFICIAL/ LAND USE OFFICE

The Planning and Zoning Commission has been busy this season with a few new business approvals in town. A nano-brewery operation was approved for the soon-to-be reopened Village General Store, Hardware and Café at 2 Wyassup Road, in the Village District. The brewery will offer beer tastings and 'growlers-to-go' to complement the cafe. Quality Propane is nearing construction on the retail propane store at 552 Providence-New London Turnpike (the old McDonald's site). They will offer retail propane equipment and propane delivery service. Farm to Gold, the makers of ghee, are under construction at 81 Norwich-Westerly Road (near the rotary). They will manufacture ghee made from grass-fed cows for retail distribution.

On the Planning side, the Commission has proposed zoning regulation changes for excavation applications and an Incentive Housing Zone Overlay District to allow for more affordable housing in town. They are also considering adding an Economic Development District to the western portion of Rt. 2, between the casino and Yerrington's Salvage. The Commission is studying a revision to Farm Breweries, to allow more flexibility, and to bring them more in line with what is currently allowed with Farm Wineries.

As always, P&Z meetings are on the 1st and 2nd Thursdays of the month. Agendas are available on the Town's website northstoningtonct.gov.

#### **EMERGENCY SERVICES BUILDING COMMITTEE**

As reported previously, initial bids in 2016 for the construction phase of the Center for Emergency Services project fell beyond the town-approved budget of \$6.3 Million. Thus, the committee was mandated to focus on a redesign with the Architectural Firm Silver-Petrucelli, in order to yield a facility that meets the operational needs of the town's Emergency Services but does not exceed the town-approved budget.

During the past quarter, the proposed building construction drawings and specifications were re-engineered by Silver-Petrucelli, with input and-oversight by the committee and First Selectman Murphy. A reduction of the building footprint from approximately 20k sq ft to approximately 13k sq ft. was accomplished. That effort of several months is now complete and construction drawings are available for the Bid phase. The drawings and specifications are in the Fire House meeting room for public information.

The project has received approvals from USDA and town agencies and we are waiting for the approvals from State of CT DECD department to proceed into the Bid phase by late January 2017, in preparation for building construction.

In anticipation of the initiation of construction, the project has secured CREC of Hartford, which is a company that specializes in Project Management and 'Clerk of the Works' Construction services.

The Emergency Services Building Committee encourages members of the North Stonington community to attend its meetings, which are posted on the Town's website and are generally held at the North Stonington Fire House Meeting Room at 6PM every Monday, unless otherwise posted. Depending upon the outcome of the receipt and opening of the bids, a description of milestone actions and dates of completion will be posted on the Town's website.


#### TOWN GOVERNMENT STRUCTURE COMMITTEE

With more and more mandates coming from the state, ongoing planning for improved town operations, and a myriad of daily government issues needing attention, it is increasingly difficult for our few elected officials to move us forward into the future.

A committee of seven townspeople has been appointed by the Board of Selectmen to conduct studies, research the structure of similar towns, and provide recommendations for alternate forms of town management. The committee members are Nita Kincaid, Anne Nelson, Paul Simonds, Dan Smith Dan Spring, William Ricker and Diana Urban.

With a goal of early March, the committee is working to produce a report to the selectmen that will offer the best approaches to meet our town's needs and will provide continuity and stability as administrations change.

Initial recommendations may include a full-time non-partisan administrator, educated, trained and experienced in small town governance, to work with all town boards and commissions to execute the town's Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD). This plan was completed in 2013 after extensive year-long input from citizens, business and property owners, elected officials and volunteers. We are now three years into the 2013 adopted plan with much to do in this decade. Everyone can read the full document on-line on the town's website.



The committee is now doing more in-depth analysis of the town's needs and additional ideas are being reviewed. Meetings are open to the public and are on alternate Wednesdays at the Wheeler Library with agendas and minutes posted on the town's website.

#### NORTH STONINGTON SENIOR CENTER

**The North Stonington Golden Agers** meet at the Center on the first Wednesday of each month at 12:30pm. Membership is \$10.00 a year. We offer several social events and a yearly scholarship. Applications will be available February 1<sup>st</sup> at the HS guidance office and Wheeler Library. North Stonington residents and descendants of current Golden Ager members are eligible. #### NORTH STONINGTON VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY, INC.

During the months of September, October and November 2016, your volunteers at the North Stonington Volunteer Fire Company (NSVFC) responded to a total of 88 emergency 911 calls for help. Of these calls, 4 were brush fires, 18 were false alarms, 3 involved hazardous materials, 1 was a medical assist, 3 were mutual aid assistance to surrounding towns, 11 were motor vehicle accidents (two fatalities), 7 were power lines down, 2 were service calls, 4 were vehicle fires, 2 were patient/victim lift assists, 1 was a vehicle lockout involving children, 1 was a water rescue (one fatality), and 31 were medical aid/first responses from our EMT certified firefighter volunteers.

Responding to these emergency calls required 615 man-hours of volunteers' personal time donated to North Stonington; an average of 12 volunteers responded to these calls. There were 28 emergency calls during the daytime, 29 during the after-hours timeframe.

Your volunteers at NSVFC also contributed an additional 348 man hours involving training and drills, in order to improve their proficiencies in life-saving skills. These drills included pumping operations (water supply), mandated compliance training (infectious diseases/HAZMAT), struts and air bags (motor vehicle accident stabilization techniques), simulated structure fires, rope rescue operations, hydraulic rescue operations and car fires.

What's new? Your volunteers acquired a



sophisticated "drone," that can be employed during water rescue operations, wilderness search and rescue operations, vehicular hazardous material scenarios and brush/forest fire operations. This is a very sophisticated "state-of-the-art" device that puts our eyes above the terrain to aid in rescue and fire operations. Training with this sophisticated tool has already begun, and it is ready to deploy during an emergency, which might require its assets. We've also recently received a grant, in the amount of \$2600, from the Chelsea Groton Foundation to purchase two new defibrillation units. These new units will replace our current, older/outdated models. Thank you, Chelsea Groton!!

#### TAX COLLECTOR

The second half installment of tax bills is due in January. The last day to pay without interest is February 1, 2017. Payments may be made in the Tax Office, Monday through Friday from 9:00 to 4:00. Payments are no longer accepted at the Chelsea Groton Bank branch in town. The best way to avoid the crowds is to pay by mail. If you would like a receipt, please enclose a self-addressed stamped envelope. You may also find out how much you owe and make payments online by going to www.northstoningtonct.gov/payonline. Service fees for on-line payments are as follows: E-check \$2.00; Visa Debit \$3.95; all other debit or credit transactions 2.5% of payment amount.

After January 1<sup>st</sup>, tax payment information for your 2016 Income Tax Return can be found at the same website. Just click on "IRS Payment Records for year 2016" before hitting the search button and all payments made in 2016 will be displayed.

Supplemental motor vehicle tax bills for vehicles registered between October 2, 2015 and August 2016 are in the mail. If you purchased a vehicle and transferred license plates from the old car to the new, credit for the payment on the old car is shown on this tax bill. You MUST pay the second half payment on the old vehicle to earn the credit. Please do not disregard the second half payment on the old vehicle.

#### **Resident State Troopers**

The Connecticut Resident State Troopers, along with Troopers from Troop-E in Montville, patrol the Town of North Stonington. The statistics for the three month period of September, October and November 2016, for the Town of North Stonington, are as follows: Troopers responded to 28 motor vehicle accidents, made 1 DUI arrest and 3 narcotic arrests. They investigated 21 criminal cases which include Burglaries, Larcenies, Assaults, Domestics, Criminal Mischief and Breach of Peace. Troopers also issued 201 tickets on Town and State roads during this period.

#### ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Hope everyone enjoyed the holidays.

**Assessment Appeals:** Any taxpayer who wishes to appeal their assessment must get an application from the assessor's office after February 1, 2017, complete the form and return it before February 20<sup>th</sup>. The Board of Assessment Appeals will meet in March to hear your appeal on the 2016 Grand List.

**Elderly Homeowners Program:** If you qualify for the Elderly Homeowners Program, you need to complete and bring in your IRS Form 1040, plus the Social Security 1099 form, which will be mailed to you in early January. You or your spouse must be 65 years old on January 1<sup>st</sup> or have a Social Security disability and have the TPQY statement.

If you do not need to file IRS Form 1040, we need to see any pension statements plus interest and dividend statements that you received, as well as your Social Security 1099 form. As of this writing, we have not been informed of the income limits for the Homeowners Program 2017. It will be around \$42,900 for a married couple and \$35,200 for a single homeowner. The application period is between February 1<sup>st</sup> and May 15<sup>th</sup> 2017, so you have plenty of time to file.

Veteran's new to North Stonington who have a service connected disability, need to bring in the % disability statement so we can give you the correct exemption amount.

<u>Supplemental motor vehicle tax bills have been sent out.</u> If you purchased a motor vehicle between October 2, 2015 and August 31, 2016, and did not receive a supplemental tax bill for the motor vehicle, please call the assessor's office.

The renters program begins April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017. More on that program will be in the next newsletter.

#### NORTH STONINGTON AFFORDABLE HOUSING COMMITTEE

The Affordable Housing Committee recognizes an opportunity for the Town to expand the housing choices for the citizens by developing a parcel on Town owned land on Wintechog Hill, which could contain 47 units of one, two

and three bedrooms. A feasibility study conducted on that site supports this number, of which anywhere from 20 - 100% could be deemed affordable under Incentive Housing Zone regulations. Our Community Survey, conducted in 2008, indicates that 59% of respondents think that North Stonington needs more housing choices; 50% think the Town needs housing for younger people and 46% think that the Town needs housing that is lower priced. Since that survey, housing affordability has become more of an issue. Moving forward on this opportunity for housing would correspond to the 2013 Plan of Conservation and Development: "Expand housing choice to accommodate the needs of residents of all ages and incomes". This document is a blue print for the future for our town. The Committee urges the Town to move forward on this issue.

A bright note to start our New Year: the \$400,000 Community Block Grant to rehabilitate housing has been expended, making sustainable the affordable housing that does exist in our town. When these no-interest loans are repaid, upon the sale of the homes, that money will stay in our Town to be recycled, and loaned again, to incomequalified homeowners for home rehabilitation.

#### SCHOOL MODERNIZATION COMMITTEE

Greetings, friends. The time is quickly passing and much is being accomplished with the School Modernization initiative. Our committee has met 30 times since being appointed and has accomplished a great deal of work in that time. The project is running on schedule, based on our projections. As you may remember, last year we had conceptual designs prepared by Quisenberry/Arcari, which were the basis of the project we are constructing. Since approval of the project, the real work has begun. We have been doing soil testing, property surveys, meeting with town and state officials, and beginning preparation of our schematic (much more detailed) design plans. We also hosted a nationally renowned expert in facility design to spend a day with a small group of teachers, students, and community members, to engage in detailed discussion about how the facility we build will be used in day-to-day instruction. As expected, the process we are going through is unfolding with some very positive updates to the project.



On the Middle/High School plan, we have opted to change the direction of the building from the proposed "V" shape, to a building that runs parallel to the road. This design helps us in a variety of ways. The soil behind the Gymatorium tested slightly wet, so this helps us build the structure on firm ground. We also should manage to design a facility in a less expensive manner than the previous design because there will be less "angles". This concept also avoids interference with underground utilities and fields unlike the conceptual design did. Finally through our meetings with many architects during the hiring process, we discovered that a "campus design" was much more suitable to our footprint and also showcases the facility that we are all investing so much time and effort in building for our students.

On the Elementary school, we have discovered through environmental testing that it will make more sense for us to actually take down many of the interior (non load bearing) walls and dispose of them as bulky waste rather than sanding them down to remove the paint as would have been required by the state. This approach will now allow us to save money and also open up our design plan in a way that will truly allow us to create a 21<sup>st</sup> century learning space for our students.

The committee continues to evaluate ways to build the most state-of-the-art facility possible while realizing savings through design, construction methods, and negotiating contracts. Though there have been changes with both designs, the square footage remains the same and the overall project costs have not changed. We are continuing to work to the budget passed at referendum and the committee is committed to saving the town money wherever and whenever possible.

Our next steps include meeting with the State in February to review our final schematic designs, meeting with local officials to review our plans, and beginning to prepare bid packages, so when State funding is granted, we are ready to put a shovel in the ground.

#### **HEWITT FARM**

This fall we have been addressing several action items from the Plan of Conservation and Recreation Lands portion of our 10-year Plan of Conservation & Development document. Our support of the Federal efforts to designate the Wood-Pawcatuck Rivers and their tributaries as wild river status assures our maintenance of the 100-foot buffer zone among our major waterways and maintains the health and integrity of our lakes and ponds. This continues to be of paramount importance to the health of our town.

Vital to the protection of our conservation lands is an ongoing monitoring program our commissioners undertake with every private easement and town owned, open space parcel. As our POCD notes, conservation requires a strong management commitment. If we lack that vision, it will become costly to the preservation of the quality of life and the environment we desire.
