BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Hello North Stonington! If you read the last BOS entry to the Quarterly in July, it ended like this: “Now this isn’t to say that all is perfect. We do have $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile of chatter strips on Denison Hill Rd. The Speed Humps that the Village asked for two years ago are still not installed, and the Old Middle School is still standing.”

I am pleased to report that since the July Quarterly was published, the Speed Humps in the Village HAVE been installed, and the Old Middle School demolition has begun. Also, the Town has applied for a STEAP grant that if awarded, we may have enough money to correct the chatter strip issue on Denison Hill Rd. There is also a new resident in the John Dean Gallup House at Hewitt Farm after 3 years of the house not being occupied, and in the late Fall, a new Early Learning Center will be occupying the lower part of the old High School. These last two developments provide income to our Town.



So, what’s next? Once the Middle School comes down, there will be opportunities for all citizens to weigh in on how the property should be used. The Board of Selectmen will schedule at least one or more Public Hearings or a Community Conversation in the Spring of 2023 to solicit as much feedback as possible from our residents. This is a very prominent and important space being both on Route 2 and part of our Historic Village. It is important to do it right as it will add to our Town’s landscape for years to come.

KEEPING NORTH STONINGTON AFFORDABLE



North Stonington has been singled out for its “paltry 1.2 percent” of affordable housing in The Day newspaper’s editorial Sunday, Aug. 21. North Stonington again is cited in another article as having the lowest percentage of affordable housing in New London and Windom counties. As Paul Choinere, former editorial writer of The Day says “People need a place to live. That should be the priority.”

North Stonington has long prided itself in being a “working class” town, but lack of affordable housing has made that a false perception. Because we lack housing, we deprive our town of the vitality and diversity that makes a town livable. We are talking of housing for teachers, municipal workers, librarians, nurses, essential workers, and seniors. Many young adults, who grew up here, would like to remain in North Stonington but find that housing is not affordable and have to move elsewhere.

Forcing up housing cost are restrictive zoning laws which site homes on large lots which are environmentally destructive (urban sprawl has cost CT. 13 acres of farmland per day for the last 25 years!). This makes the cost of building housing more expensive.

Let’s make our town proud and progressive, by showing support for housing choices that are affordable, not being the “paltry” 1. 2 percenters.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION

The Economic Development Commission is excited to announce the approval of the first grants from our North Stonington Covid-19 Small Business Assistance Program. This grant program, funded through the American Rescue Funds Act, seeks to help North Stonington businesses which have been directly affected by the COVID pandemic. Businesses are eligible to up to \$10,000 in grant money based on losses sustained from 2020 to present. We had four applicants, and each showed a direct impact of COVID on their business. The EDC is happy to have funding to help these local businesses. We encourage North Stonington businesses financially affected by the pandemic to apply for this program.

The plan for the coming year is to assess and improve our website, assess additional applicants for the North Stonington Covid-19 Small Business Assistance Program and assist the committee drafting the current Plan of Conservation and Development regarding the economic development component to the document. We are also revising the Economic Development Action Plan last adopted in 2012.

Finally, the EDC is looking for additional community members to join the commission. We meet on the first Monday of the month at 6:30 p.m. If interested, please contact Town Hall.

The November 8th, 2022, State Election will soon be upon us to elect State and Federal officials and the Town's Registrars of Voters, and to vote on a proposed amendment to the State of Connecticut Constitution.

Absentee ballots are available beginning on October 7th, 2022. Applications are available in the Town Clerk's Office, on the Town website, and via mail by contacting the office. Individuals can also come to the Town Clerk's Office to obtain an absentee ballot in person, beginning on October 7th, up until the day before the election. Absentee ballots can be returned by mail, by dropping off in the Official Ballot Drop Box in front of New Town Hall, or by bringing in person to the Town Clerk's Office during normal business hours.



There will be in-person voting on November 8th at the North Stonington Education Center, the old Wheeler Middle-High School, 298 Norwich-Westerly Road from 6:00 AM until 8:00 PM.

If you have any questions regarding absentee ballots and the election, please do not hesitate to contact the Town Clerk. **Remember that every vote counts and every vote is important!**

ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Public Act 490: A reminder to owners who wish to classify their land as farmland under P.A. 490. The time to file has arrived. You have until October 31, 2022, to file. The definition of a farm is land on which you attempt to make a profit in a farming business or land that you lease to someone who uses the land to grow something or pasture farm animals. Land classified as farmland must be owned for a least 10 years to avoid a penalty.

Farm & Forest Land: Forest land classification is for a minimum of 25 acres. To classify your land as forest land, you must have a state forester inspect and approve the land. You must also retain ownership for 10 years and continue to allow the trees to grow to avoid any penalties. Selective cutting under a state forester is allowed.

Both programs allow you to save money by lowering the assessment on the land classified in either the farming or forestry program.

Personal Property Declarations were mailed on October 1st. All businesses located in the Town of North Stonington or owning taxable personal property located in town are required to file a declaration before November 1st to avoid the 25% penalty for not filing or filing late.

The Hewitt Farm pavilion can now be reserved on-line through the Recreation Department web site.





LAND USE DEVELOPMENT

Online Permitting is here! NoStoers will now be able to apply, pay for and receive approval for Building, Wetlands and Zoning Permits. The Land Use Office has been working with IT and our software vendors to bring forward an online permit process that allows residents and their contractors the ability to electronically file and track permits. Permits will now be filed and stored electronically, eliminating the old paper-based system. Applicants who do not have access to a computer may still come to Town Hall and file electronically via the Land Use reception desk computer. Payments may be made online via credit card or in person via check. If you seek to file your online permit, go to <https://www.northstoningtonct.gov/land-use-department> or follow the provided QR code.



Year over year Land Use Permit activity remains stable to slightly increasing. The first two months of FY 23 eclipsed last year's totals. FY 22 narrowly edged out FY 21 for non-large solar permits. Building activity remains strong in North Stonington with a lot of work in the pipeline.



EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Hello, everyone! I hope everyone is doing well. Well, hurricane season officially started on 1 June. This year's hurricane forecast is expected to be even more active than 2021, so get ready now.

Establish a family communication plan and be prepared to leave. If instructed to evacuate, head away from the threat's direction. If you choose to stay, you may experience extended power outages, property damage or injury.

- We recommend that you gather **Needed Supplies**, for at least three days including non-perishable food, medications (insulin, oxygen, etc.); an emergency medical kit; hygiene/sanitation items (a 5-gallon bucket and a box of trash bags for use as a toilet); water (1 gallon person, per day); a water sanitation straw; batteries; bees wax candles (no soot or smoke) and matches; and gas for your generator.
- Other recommended items include a radio with multiple power options (hand generator crank, batteries or solar); sleeping bags and blanket; and a tarp and nylon rope available for constructing a lean-to shelter.
- Have cash on hand (in a power outage nothing works, you made need to make cash purchases).
- Fill your gas tank and propane tanks. Never use a generator, gasoline powered equipment, a grill or camp stove within 20 feet from doors, windows, vents, to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Keep your cell phone and laptop charged. Stay away from ALL power, cable, and telephone lines.
- If you remain, stay indoors, and go to a windowless room on the lowest level that is unlikely to flood. Do not take shelter in the attic.
- Do not drive through flooded areas; (6 inches of flowing water can float a car) and do not wade through flooded areas (water can be contaminated by sewage, dead animals, oil, gas, debris, etc.).
- Bring animals indoors.

Please note the Tax Collector now maintains the following in person hours, Monday and Thursday 8:30am – 4:00pm.

Tax Bills are now delinquent for any payments made or received after August 1, 2022. Interest is calculated at 1.5% per month or 18% per year from the due date July 1, Connecticut State Statue Sec. 12-146. If you are unaware of the amount you owe or would like to make a payment online, please visit www.mytaxbill.net/northstonington. Service fees for on-line payments are as follows; E-check \$2.00, Visa Debit \$3.95, all other debit, or credit transactions 2.5% of payment amount. Credit card payments will NOT be accepted over the phone. A secure drop box is available for off hours outside of Town Hall where payments can be left and processed the next business day.

All delinquent motor vehicle taxes are reported to the State of Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles. This will prevent you from renewing your registration. All delinquent taxes on all motor vehicles under your name must be paid in full before a DMV clearance can be given from the town. Thank you and Happy Fall.
